REGISTER TO VOTE

Voter Registration closes October 9, 2007 for the November 6, 2007 election

In order to vote in Cuyahoga County, you must meet the following requirements:

- You must be a United States Citizen;
- You must be at least 18 years old on the day of the General Election;
- You must be a resident of Cuyahoga County for at least 30 days;
- You must register to vote at least 30 days before an election to be eligible to vote.
- 17 year old residents can register and vote in a Primary Election if they will be 18 on or before the General Election. 17-year-olds can vote for candidates only.

How do I register to vote?

Registering to vote is a very simple process.

- Visit a local public library, public high school, the Cuyahoga County Board of Elections offices (2925 Euclid Avenue, Cleveland), state government offices or any place where you can renew your driver's license.
- Call the Cuyahoga County Board of Elections at 216-443-3298 for a Voter Registration Card to be mailed to you. Complete it and mail it back.
- If you have Internet access, you may download a form from the Cuyahoga County Board of Elections- boe.cuyahogacounty.us Complete it and mail it in.

Question 1: Several Eastside school districts have investigated establishing a joint Student Special Services District to meet special education needs. Would you support establishing one?
Yes, cooperative regionalization of special education could benefit our District. The costs of special education services, presently comprising nearly 20% of our annual operating budget, grow rapidly due to the escalating costs of medical/quasi-medical services and the trend towards increasing identification of special needs. Because these services are federally mandated, we cannot control the growth of this budget area. Cooperation across the region would allow economies of scale - without compromising quality - because expensive or scarce specialized services could be consolidated and shared. Additionally, "risk pooling" would spread costs of students with low incidence, severe disabilities. For example, districts now, without notice, can suddenly acquire a student with special education needs approximating \$90,000 or more per year. Our district typically has 25 to 30 low-incidence disability students each requiring services up to \$75,000 per year. Already, our Superintendent has been spearheading an effort to establish a regional cooperative program.

Question 1: Several Eastside school districts have investigated establishing a joint Student Special Services District to meet special education needs. Would you support establishing one?
I support collaborations that can provide better and more cost-effective services to Shaker children, and I would be willing to explore any such opportunity. "Low-incidence" special education needs are an appropriate focus of such collaborations, and HB 250 was introduced in the last legislative session to establish such a district. Before supporting an idea like the one that was proposed in HB 250, I would want to understand why a new organization with its own board, fiscal officers, and legal representation - and a new layer of taxes - is needed to ensure better and more cost-effective services.
Are we getting the full benefit out of existing collaborations like the county's Educational Services Center and Special Education Resource Center? Are there opportunities in our proximity to the Clinic, UH, CWRU, CSU, JCU, and others? I am very interested in pursuing such questions as a school board member.

Question 2: What can school board members do to promote reconciliation between the inherently competing financial needs of the school district and the tax payers?
We must (1) maintain the discipline of adhering to the spending plan adopted by the Board to live with our means. Although our 5-year projections are premised on reasonable assumptions about enrollment and inflation, "wildcards" exist: increasingly expensive legislative mandates and federal/state funding uncertainties. (2) Accordingly, we must vigorously lobby state/federal officials for adequate funding, to fix Ohio's broken funding system, to provide more reasonable contributions towards the costly mandates they impose and to craft the mandates more appropriately. (3) We must support/encourage our city's efforts to grow our commercial tax base to ameliorate residential tax burden. (4) Meanwhile, our schools must maintain high-quality programs and offerings to attract/retain successful families so housing values will remain healthy and the economic vitality of our community will be sustained/increased. While cutting quality could reduce costs, in the long term it would be against the best interests of our children, community, and future.

Question 2: What can school board members do to promote reconciliation between the inherently competing financial needs of the school district and the tax payers?
The financial needs of schools and taxpayers are *not* inherently competing: Excellent schools boost property values, and that benefits taxpayers.
However, as long as school funding depends on property taxes and Shaker Heights is so lacking in commercial real estate, Shaker residents will bear the brunt of school financing. School Board members can advocate for changes in state tax laws and for real estate development within the city, but we cannot depend on either. Most importantly, school board members must act as representatives of the community in making budget and levy request decisions, and must work to communicate with the community about those decisions. Shaker Heights residents want to know that every effort is being made to seek other sources of funding, spend dollars wisely, and realize the maximum benefit for our students and the community from each tax dollar.

Question 3: What new initiatives would you like to see the Shaker Heights schools undertake?
For our students to understand and become prepared to participate in increasingly global culture and economy, we should accelerate our efforts to update curricular offerings. Long a proponent of increased opportunities for instruction in Pacific Rim languages and culture, I am thrilled with our new and expanding Mandarin offerings. Given the need for global understanding, Arabic language should be considered as well. But for foreign language instruction to be most effective, REGULAR programming should begin in elementary grades.
Similarly, we should continue to update and add to curricular and extra curricular opportunities leading towards further education and careers for our students in science, engineering, medicine and technology.
We must seek additional ways to provide more instructional time and well-designed initiatives targeted for underachieving students.
We should accelerate our commendable trend towards serving healthier food in the cafeterias. We should consider ways to make buildings and operations more environmentally sound/sustainable.

Question 3: What new initiatives would you like to see the Shaker Heights schools undertake?
Maintaining and enhancing Shaker's reputation for excellence requires constant vigilance. I support efforts like the recent introduction of Chinese language and an engineering prep program. I want to see how students can better access, benefit from, and participate in the flood of innovation that is reinventing virtually every field of human endeavor. For example, I want to be sure our math and science programs are world class, both in what they expect in the classroom and in how they connect students to the advances in real-world applications that so many of the adults in our community work on every day. And I want to support efforts to make academic expectations clear and to help staff, students, parents, and guardians translate those expectations into the daily work of academic success. This last effort, I believe, will help in the vital effort to close the achievement gap.

Question 1: What is your top priority for economic development and how would you fund it?
Under my leadership the City of Shaker Heights would to create a public/private partnership to deploy a Citywide Wireless Meshed Broadband Network in support of a City Wide Infrastructure Strategy. This strategy would create a stronger community for all residents of Shaker while strengthening our ability to secure our community. This partnership will use the wireless network to improve the quality of life for our citizens, students, visitors and businesses.
A main goal of the network would be to improve the delivery of City government services and improve worker productivity by supporting the City's mobile workforce and first responders who serve Shaker.
I would use it to streamline the interaction between City government and other government entities and agencies.
It would be aligned with my efforts as Mayor to improving services to next generation businesses and jobs.
The network would be paid for through grants and Ohio Third Frontier investments.

Question 2: Shaker Heights has a high number of housing nuisance abatement actions and record number of foreclosures. What can Shaker Heights do to deal with these issues and how would you finance the necessary actions?
Under my leadership Shaker Heights will deal with its housing issues through creating a public bond issuance to buy foreclosed property in Shaker Heights and fix these homes up for resale through the efforts of Shaker Contractors, where cost effective. These bonds would be sold to the CRA Fund a \$745 million dollar mutual fund that supports communities by helping transform problem housing under the community reinvestment act. I would look to the local banks and savings and loans in Shaker for support of this socially beneficial project.
At the same time I would develop as part of my City Wide Infrastructure Strategy a housing nuisance abatement action team whose job it is to cross city, county, state and federal department lines to provide solutions to these homes with the assistance of a collation of 50 experienced non-governmental organizations.

Question 3: How would you prioritize addressing infrastructure problems and basic City services?
Under my leadership during the first 90 days the City of Shaker Heights would to create a City Wide Infrastructure Strategy Planning Group. It would do a SWOT Analysis of the cities infrastructure problems with an emphasis on streets, homeland security, public safety and youth. SWOT is a strategic planning tool used to evaluate the Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities, and Threats involved in a project.
My administration would draw on the expertise of the aforementioned 50 experienced non-governmental organizations to specifying the objective of the city needs and use them to identify the internal and external factors that are favorable and unfavorable to achieving the objective of my administration, a more cosmopolitan and distinctive suburb with state of the art technology infrastructure. This infrastructure will include a Citywide Wireless Meshed Broadband Network in support of the City; Shaker Heights is known nationally as a model of diversity and superior public education.

Question 1: What is your top priority for economic development and how would you fund it?
Grow the tax base:
- The Van Aken Center Project- to revitalize this older center into a new and vibrant commercial area with highest quality retail, commercial, residential and entertainment components. Phase I included the movement of University Hospitals Administration to the OfficeMax building creating 900 new jobs for Shaker Heights. We are working with developer Bob Stark (Crocker Park and Eton Collection) and the Ratner family which owns much of the property. Because if its location and proximity to major highways and public transportation, an expanded Van Aken Center can draw from the entire east side. Funding will come from federal, state and county funds, the current property ownership and from the City's extraordinary economic development reserve A successful project will add significantly to city and school district tax revenue.
- Continue the developments at Shaker Town Center, Avalon Station, the south side of Chagrin and Lee.

Question 2: Shaker Heights has a high number of housing nuisance abatement actions and record numbers of foreclosures. What can Shaker Heights do to deal with these issues and how would you finance the necessary actions?
- Shaker's nuisance abatement program allows us to aggressively move to correct housing violations when owners fail to do so. A lien is put on the house to allow us to recover the cost of repairs when the property is sold. Funding is provided through a county loan fund which provides us with access to \$500,000 a year to accomplish our goals.
- We must enforce our strong ordinances holding landlords responsible for continued violations on their properties and imposing fines and revocation of certificates of occupancy which may deny them the right to rent the properties until they correct the problems.
- We must continue to assist home owners in avoiding predatory lending and foreclosures; including working with other municipalities, the state, county and federal government to provide additional legislation and enforcement against lenders who are acting improperly.

Question 3: How would you prioritize addressing infrastructure problems and basic City services?
We must do both.
- High quality city services must be maintained to meet the high standards of Shaker residents and to allow us to continue to attract and retain new residents. Priorities must be established within the capital budget for infrastructure needs and within the operating budget for city services rather than choosing one over the other
- We must replicate regional collaborations such as our recent agreement with the City of Cleveland whereby Cleveland takes ownership of our water lines and provides us with a portion of the charges already in effect for all users of water from the Cleveland Division of Water to fund water line replacement and repair. We have already received an initial grant of \$4.6 million from these funds which relieves our capital budget of the need to expend such amounts. Additional infrastructure issues must be addressed using this model of collaboration.

Question 1: What is your top priority for economic development and how would you fund it?

The commercial/residential mixed use development of Warrensville/Van Aken would be my top priority, because it would have the greatest impact on growing Shaker's tax base, which would in turn allow the City 1) to continue to fund strong City services and program without raising taxes, 2) to produce future property tax revenues to ensure stable school funding, and 3) to make Shaker a national model for transit-oriented development, supporting sustainable transportation alternatives. The funding of this development would come from a public/private partnership with investment by 1) the City through TIF funding for infrastructure and allocations from the ED and land reserves, 2) the private development community and 3) a coalition of county, state, and federal funding sources, including Port Authority and RTA.

Question 1: What is your top priority for economic development and how would you fund it?

My top priority for economic development will be to engage in dialog with local business owners, to assess their immediate needs and determine the best way to keep them in our community. We have a solid base of local businesses that have needs that should be addressed immediately. These business owners should be engaged in any talk about new development initiatives because they are the base of Shakers existing business community. They can provide valuable insight into how best to improve our current business underpinnings. Funding for this type of collaboration would be minimal and not be a burden on our already struggling economy.

Question 2: How can the City of Shaker Heights further develop the Community Building and its surrounding grounds to serve the needs of all citizens of all ages?

This area currently includes: Library, Colonnade and park, RTA Station, Around-the-World Playground, soccer field, asphalt sidewalk/trail, and STC commercial district. Per the Lee/Van Aken Transit-Oriented Development Plan, improved access by all modes of transportation- train, bus, car, bicycle and pedestrian- with a \$3M redesigned, multi-level RTA station will be developed. Redeveloping Shaker Towne Center with Avalon Station and additional TOD initiatives will attract residents for homes, retail and entertainment. Connecting the RTA station to the Community Building grounds by pedestrian crosswalks and signalization will promote its use as passive green space and park for performing and visual arts events at the Colonnade. A covered walkway linking the Shaker Library and Community Building would foster joint usage/programming. Improving/maintaining the paved asphalt exercise loop around the Library and soccer field/playground could increase its use. Partnering with the Library, the City could install wireless connectivity throughout this area for the public/businesses.

Question 2: How can the City of Shaker Heights further develop the Community Building and its surrounding grounds to serve the needs of all citizens of all ages?

I don't necessarily agree that further development of the Community Building is a priority for the city at this time. Citizens of any age can utilize the facilities if need be. Perhaps we could do a better job of informing folks of what the center has to offer. If the citizens were to communicate a concern to me, I would explore further development opportunities. I think there is a bigger need in the city for further development of Thornton Park. I know for a fact that there is a desire by many citizens to continue improvement at Thornton. We have made significant enhancements to the pool and the other recreation areas, but I think there is still plenty of room for development.

Question 3: How would you engage the public to assure that you receive advice from and understand the concerns of citizens on the important issues that will affect the future of Shaker Heights?

As a Council member, I would put important legislation on three readings, including public comment on each read. City committee/commission meetings should also accept public comment on these issues. Additionally, information, advice and concerns can be shared at neighborhood association meetings, community organization meetings and block parties as well as through newsletters. When possible, I would use electronic media (email, e-newsletters, websites, discussion boards) and print media like Shaker Life Magazine to solicit and receive public input. To facilitate general communication with the entire community, I would hold town hall meetings on issues of concern. As a member of Council, I have worked and would continue to work with focus groups of citizens to solicit opinions on important issues. Finally, as a Council member, I regularly receive individual communication from residents and I have responded and will continue to respond personally to each communication.

Question 3: How would you engage the public to assure that you receive advice from and understand the concerns of citizens on the important issues that will affect the future of Shaker Heights?

Establishing an open line of communication with the citizens of Shaker will be my number one priority when elected to Council. Our community is very vocal and wants to be involved with decisions rendered by their representatives. Unfortunately, members of the community have expressed concern about not being heard or involved in decisions that are made at the city government level. Once elected I will establish an office phone line dedicated to the citizens of Shaker Heights. This "hotline" will be available 24/7 for citizens to call about any issue they deem relevant. I will make every attempt to respond to EVERY concern expressed and take the necessary action for resolution. I will also reach out to the various community groups and organizations, making time to create an open line of dialog, so that they know their voices are heard in council.

CLEVELAND-CUYAHOGA COUNTY PORT AUTHORITY PROPOSED TAX LEVY (RENEWAL)

A renewal of an existing levy to constitute a tax for the benefit of the Cleveland-Cuyahoga County Port Authority for the purpose of providing funds necessary for the Port Authority Budget, at a rate not exceeding 0.13 Mill for each one dollar of valuation, which amount to \$0.013 for each one hundred dollars of valuation, for five years.

The following Pros and Cons on this issue were prepared by the League of Women Voters of Cleveland.

PROS:

- The Cleveland-Cuyahoga County Port Authority is asking for no increase in funding.
- Money collected from the tax levy makes up about 34% of the Cleveland-Cuyahoga County Port Authority's budget. Passage will enable the Cleveland-Cuyahoga County Port Authority to continue its current maritime and development finance activities resulting in more jobs and economic growth.

CONS:

- The Cleveland-Cuyahoga County Port Authority does not provide budget documentation that shows how the tax money is spent within the Cleveland-Cuyahoga County Port Authority budget.
- In its campaign literature, the Cleveland-Cuyahoga County Port Authority asserts that 11,000 direct and induced jobs are generated by Cleveland-Cuyahoga County Port Authority facilities and financial development activities. The Cleveland-Cuyahoga County Port Authority has not provided documentation to verify this claim.

TAKE THE RIGHT ID TO THE POLLS

YOU MUST SHOW ONE OF THESE IN ORDER TO VOTE A REGULAR BALLOT:

- Ohio driver's license or State ID –the ID can have either your current or former address, as long as the ID has not expired. Or other Ohio or U.S. government photo-ID showing your name and current address;
- OR one of the following from the last year that shows your current address:
 - military ID (does not need to show current address if shows Social Security number),
 - copy of a current "utility" bill (e.g. water, sewer, gas, electricity, cable, cell-phone)
 - bank statement,
 - paycheck,
 - government check, or
 - local, state or federal government document (including from public college or university).

You cannot use the notice you received from the Board of Elections.

If you are a registered voter but don't have any acceptable form of ID when you come to the polls, you still have a right to cast a provisional ballot, which should be counted if:

- You truthfully affirm in writing that you are an eligible and registered voter, AND
- You do just ONE of the following things: (1) provide the last four digits of your Social Security number at the polling place, OR (2) if you don't have any acceptable form of ID OR a Social Security number, you affirm that fact in writing, OR (3) If you don't do (1) or (2) at the polling place, you go to your Board of Elections within 10 days of the election and supply ID, last 4 digits of Social Security number, or sign an affirmation.

ABSENTEE BALLOT INFORMATION

Any qualified Ohio voter may request an absentee ballot without stating a reason. The ballot must be applied for in writing. If you are properly registered to vote, you must submit your written request to the board of elections of the county in which your voting residence is located. Absentee ballot applications may be obtained from the Cuyahoga County Board of Elections boe.cuyahogacounty.us or by calling 1-216-443-3298.

To receive your absentee ballot:

By mail: Unless you are a member of the U.S. armed forces, you must mail your properly completed absentee ballot application bearing your original signature to the board of elections of the county in which your voting residence is located. The board must receive your request by noon on the Saturday before the election. However, you should submit your request as far in advance of the election as possible.

In person: You may go to the board of elections office during regular business hours after absentee ballots are available for voting, but no later than the day before the election, and request, receive and vote your ballot at the board office.

For your absentee ballot to be counted, it must be received as follows:

If cast from anywhere in the United States, whether returned in person or by mail, your ballot must be received by your county board of elections by 7:30 p.m. on Election Day.

IF YOU REQUEST AN ABSENTEE BALLOT, YOU WILL NOT BE ALLOWED TO VOTE OR TURN IN YOUR BALLOT AT THE POLLING PLACE ON ELECTION DAY.

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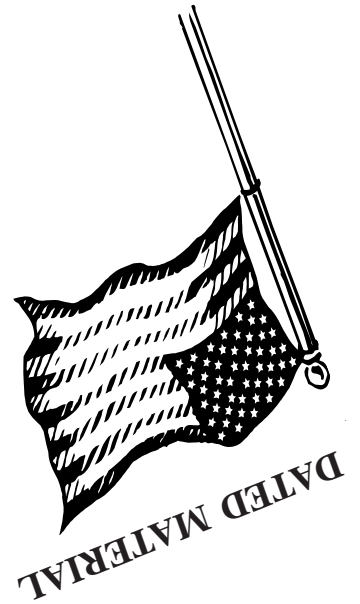
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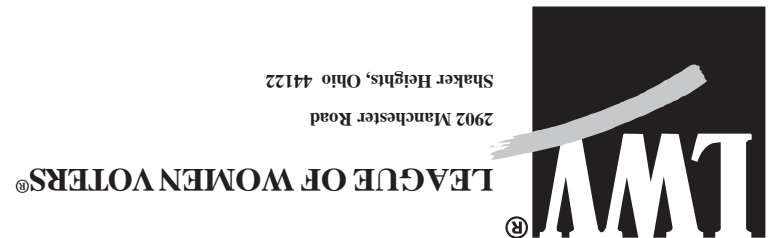
